## Public transport:

### By plane:

From **Tegel** airport: take Bus 109 to Adenauerplatz/Kurfürstendamm. Change there to Bus 119 (leaving from the opposite side of the street). Take bus marked 'S-Bhf Grunewald' and get off at 'Hagenplatz/ Taubertstraße'. There turn left, the second street on the right will be *Bismarckallee*.

From **Schönefeld** airport: take S-Bahn (line S9) in the direction of 'Grunewald'. Get off at 'Grunewald' station, there change either to bus 119 and get off at 'Hagenplatz/ Taubertstraße' or walk along "Fontanestraße/Koenigsallee" (ca. 800 m) to 'Hagenplatz' and follow the directions as above.

From **Tempelhof** airport: take Bus 119 marked 'S-Bhf Grunewald' and get off at 'Hagenplatz/Taubertstraße' and follow the directions as above.

### By train (from easterly direction):

From **'Lichtenberg'** railway station: take the S-Bahn (line S7) in the direction of 'Wannsee DB'. Get off at 'Grunewald' station and follow the directions as above.

### By train (from westerly direction):

From **'Zoologischer Garten'** railway station: either take S-Bahn (line 7 direction Wannsee DB) and get off at 'Grunewald' station or walk to Kurfürstendamm (about 400 m) and take Bus 119 at the streetcorner of Kurfürstendamm and Joachimstaler Straße and follow the directions as above.

From **'Wannsee'** S-Bahn station: take S-Bahn (line S7) in the direction of 'Ahrensfelde', get off at 'Grunewald' station and follow the directions as above.

### By car:

From **Hannover** or **Nürnberg**: take exit 'Berlin/Zentrum' on the 'Berliner Ring'. Carry on to exit 'Hüttenweg', turn right and go straight ahead until the first traffic lights, turn left there and follow the road straight ahead until you get to 'Hagenplatz'. Approx. 300 m after the first traffic lights turn right into Bismarckallee. It is the second building on the right.

From **Hamburg**: take exit A 111 in the direction of 'Zentrum/Charlottenburg'. Go past the congress centre (ICC) and turn right into A 115 in the direction of 'Hannover/Nürnberg', exit 'Hüttenweg', and there turn left and carry on as stated above.

From **Frankfurt/Oder** or **Dresden**: drive along 'Berliner Ring' in the direction of 'Magdeburg/Hannover' up to the motorway merging point 'Nuthetal'. Turn right into A 115, and at the next traffic lights turn left and go straight ahead to 'Hagenplatz'. Carry on as stated above.
